The following members were present: Chairman Lesley Miller Jr. and Commissioners Kevin Beckner, Victor Crist, Al Higginbotham (arrived at 9:27 a.m.), and Sandra Murman.

The following members were absent: Commissioners Ken Hagan and Stacy White.

- Chairman Miller called the meeting to order at 9:05 a.m., led in the pledge of allegiance to the flag, and gave the invocation.

Mr. Craig Latimer, Supervisor of Elections, offered remarks. Dr. Richard Garrity, former EPC Executive Director, touched on how the EPC achieved the GSA. Chairman Miller bestowed a proclamation declaring Falkenburg Road as a road of excellence. Ms. Dougherty presented a GSA miniature model and a framed photograph to EPC Board members and Dr. Garrity and unveiled the road sign. Following Board member commendations, Ms. Dougherty gave Messrs. Belden and Latimer certificates of appreciation.

2. Executive Director's 2016 Annual Agency Report

Ms. Dougherty recognized EPC/County staff, and shared a presentation, as furnished in background material.

3. PRF Grant Projects - Request for Approvals

Mr. Tom Ash, EPC, highlighted a presentation, as contained in background material, and sought staff recommendation to approve the projects as presented. Commissioner Murman made the motion, seconded by Commissioner Crist, and carried five to zero. (Commissioners Hagan and White were absent.) Chairman Miller said the second motion was to authorize the EPC Chairman, on a continual basis, to execute the approved PRF agreements. 4. Executive Director's Evaluation Procedural Briefing

EPC General Counsel Richard Tschantz referred to the item, which was distributed to the EPC Board and presented in background material, and outlined the process to be followed.

D. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

1. Updates and Other Business

After mentioning phone calls received from citizens about the lack of fish in Tampa Bay possibly due to the Pinellas County sewage spill caused by Hurricane Hermine and deteriorated water quality, Commissioner Murman requested a memorandum be sent to the EPC Board and wanted County stormwater staff to work with the EPC. Commissioner Crist proposed conducting an assessment of the St. Petersburg dumping effects determining the impacts/losses. Mr. Sam Elrabi, Director, EPC Water Management Division, reported on the effects of Hurricane Hermine, city of Tampa water maintenance and overflow monitoring, disaster plans, and municipality permitting for collection/treatment/disposal. sewage Subsequent to commenting on sewage cleanup/additional rain, Miller referenced a map of an upcoming tropical storm and suggested immediate action.

Commissioner Beckner wanted EPC staff/Public Works to address risk mitigation on how much additional stormwater/sewage system strain the County could handle, what level amount of rain the County would have to encounter, the type of hurricane/impacts the County would have to incur before facing significant risks, whether the EPC Board needed to be proactive, and asked EPC staff to provide a risk assessment at the next Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) meeting during Commissioner Murman's agenda item. Commissioner Murman stressed the importance of working collaboratively to develop a risk assessment, requested the water quality be examined before the next BOCC meeting, and desired answers for the constituents. After agreeing to reach out to St. Petersburg Mayor Rick

Brief Summary: The EPC Legal Department provides a monthly summary of its ongoing civil, appellate, and

administrative matters.

Background: In an effort to provide the Commission with timely information regarding legal challenges, the EPC staff provides this monthly summary. The update serves not only to inform the Commission of current litigation but may also be used as a tool to check for any conflicts they may have in the event a legal matter is discussed by the Commission. The summary provides general details as to the status of the civil and administrative cases. There is also a listing of cases where parties have asked for additional time in order to allow them to decide whether they will file an administrative challenge to an agency action (e.g. – permitting decision or enforcement order), while concurrently attempting to seek resolution of the agency action.

EPC LEGAL DEPARTMENT MONTHLY REPORT October 2016

I. ADMINISTRATIVE CASES

Weiner v. Roberts [16-EPC-007]: On July 25, 2016, the Appellant Gary Weiner filed a Notice of Appeal challenging the issuance of the TPA MWP#60883. The parties were in negotiations to attempt to amicably settle the matter. The permit has been modified to remove a portion of the structure and the permit has been reissued and sent to the neighbor for review. If no amended appeal is timely filed challenging the revised permit the matter will be closed.

J.E. McLean, III and RaceTrac Petroleum, Inc. [12-EPC-014]: On October 24, 2012, the Appellants, RaceTrac Petroleum, Inc. and the property owner, filed a request for an extension of time to file an Appeal challenging the Executive Director's denial for wetland impacts on the corner of Lumsden and Kings Avenue. The extension was granted and the Appellants filed an appeal in this matter on December 7, 2012. A Hearing Officer has been assigned and conducted a case management conference. This matter was placed in abeyance as the parties discussed options. A conceptual wetland impact approval letter was sent to the applicant on December 8, 2015 after a modification to the application was submitted. The Appellants have not filed a dismissal as they are waiting for final approval of the proposed project by Hillsborough County.

II. CIVIL CASES

<u>Volkswagen AG, et al.</u> [16-EPC-002]: On March 24, 2016, the EPC filed a complaint against Volkswagen AG, et al. for activities that violate the EPC Enabling Act and the rules promulgated thereunder.

Bank of NY Mellon Trust [15-EPC-012]: On December 4, 2015, the Bank of NY Mellon Trust Company National Association served upon the EPC a Verified Complaint for Foreclosure of Mortgage naming EPC as a Defendant in the matter. There is a bankruptcy stay regarding this matter and the case will remain in abeyance until further action in Bankruptcy Court in the case below: <u>U.S. Bankruptcy Court in re Jerry A. Lewis</u>. This case will be closed as the matter will be addressed in the Bankruptcy matter.

<u>Janet Layer</u> [15-EPC-009]: In December of 2015 the EPC Commission authorized staff to take appropriate legal action against Ms. Janet Layer for failure to comply with various wastewater regulations regarding her operation of the domestic wastewater treatment plant and disposal system at Little Manatee Isles Mobile Home Park in Ruskin. The EPC filed a complaint and counsel for Ms. Layer answered the complaint on August 5, 2016.

<u>U.S. Bankruptcy Court in re Jerry A. Lewis Adversary Proceeding</u> [15-EPC-007]: An Adversary Proceeding pertaining to the ongoing Chapter 13 Bankruptcy Case regarding Jerry A. Lewis (see EPC Case No. LEPC09-011) was entered on October 9, 2013, in the U.S. Bankruptcy Court Middle District of Florida. EPC is defendant in the matter and will seek to protect a monetary judgment awarded to us by the Circuit Court.

U.S. Bankruptcy Court in re Jerry A. Lewis [LEPC09-011]: On May 1, 2009, the U.S. Bankruptcy Court Middle District of Florida filed a Notice of Chapter 13 Bankruptcy Case regarding Jerry A. Lewis. On May 26, 2009, the EPC filed a Proof of Claim with the Court. The EPC's basis for the claim is a recorded judgment lien awarded in Civil Court against Mr. Lewis concerning unauthorized disposal of solid waste. The EPC obtained an award of stipulated penalties from the state court. The site remains out of compliance with applicable EPC solid waste regulations and no liens have been paid. The bankruptcy case is ongoing.

Grace E. Poole and Michael Rissell [LEPC08-015]: Authority to take appropriate legal action against Grace E. Poole and Michael Rissell for failure to properly assess petroleum contamination in accordance with EPC and State regulations was granted on June 19, 2008. The property owner and/or other responsible party are required to initiate a site assessment and submit a Site Assessment Report. They have failed to do the required work and the EPC is attempting to obtain appropriate corrective actions.

Boyce E. Slusmeyer [LEPC10-019]: On Sept 20, 2001, the EPC staff received authority to take legal action for failure to comply with an Executive Director's Citation and Order to Correct Violation for the failure to initiate a cleanup of a petroleum-contaminated property. The Court entered a Consent Final Judgment on March 13, 2003. The Defendant has failed to perform the appropriate remedial actions for petroleum contamination on the property. The EPC filed a lawsuit on

October 7, 2010 seeking injunctive relief and recovery of costs and penalties. The property ownership is currently in a probate proceeding and the EPC is waiting for resolution of the matter to move forward.

Thomas Jennings and Lorene Hall-Jennings [14-EPC011]: On October 7, 2014, the EPC was served with a Declaratory Action challenging the validity of a conservation easement conveyed to the EPC on September 16, 1997. The EPC Legal Department has responded to the lawsuit with an Answer and Affirmative Defenses on October 27, 2014 and the case will move forward as appropriate. On October 12, 2015 the Plaintiff filed a Motion for Judgment on the Pleadings. The EPC responded to the Motion on October 21, 2015. The Plaintiff has scheduled the Hearing on the Motion for November 14, 2016.

III. PENDING ADMINISTRATIVE CHALLENGES

The following is a list of cases assigned to the EPC Legal Department that are not in litigation, but a party has asked for an extension of time to file for administrative litigation in an effort to negotiate a settlement prior to forwarding the case to a Hearing Officer. Background:

Since the EPC's receipt of delegation of the State's Brownfields program in the summer of 2004, the redevelopment of a number of previously underutilized sites have been completed resulting in the redevelopment of previously blighted, underutilized and non-utilized properties. Similarly, since the inception of the EPC's Old Landfill Redevelopment program, 95 of a list of 176 old landfill sites have been successfully redeveloped and returned to productive use. With the State of Florida's recognition that changes to the State's Brownfields regulation is needed in order to more clearly address historic solid waste disposal area redevelopment, it is anticipate that the reuse of these sites will only increase.

In this brief two part presentation, staff intends to update the Board with regard to the successes of the EPC's Brownfields and Old Landfill redevelopment programs.

Financial Impact: No Financial Impact

Background: Mosaic's New Wales fertilizer facility, located in Polk County just east of County Line Road, experienced a large sinkhole under the phosphogypsum stack. The sinkhole resulted in wastewater in the pond on top of the stack to enter the Floridan aquifer. Mosaic is using production wells onsite to recover contaminated groundwater.

Results from groundwater monitoring wells on Mosaic's property indicate the process water is being contained onsite. Continued groundwater monitoring will gauge any offsite or long-term effects.

Mosaic has contracted with a consultant to conduct private potable well sampling at the citizens' request and is also providing bottle water at request. The FDEP and the FDOH in Polk County are also conducting potable well sampling. To date, Mosaic and FDEP report that all potable well sampling results to date have met health-based standards.

Mosaic's consulting company is assessing the sinkhole feature and developing a comprehensive corrective action plan. The Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) and the USEPA are overseeing Mosaic's response. EPC is in contact with the FDEP and Mosaic and is monitoring the situation.
