The Environmental Protection Commission (EPC), Hillsborough County, Florida, met in Special Meeting scheduled for Wednesday, April 2, 2014, at 3:00 p.m., in the Boardroom, Frederick B. Karl County Center, Tampa, Florida.

The following members were present: Chairman Lesley Miller Jr. and Commissioners Kevin Beckner, Victor Crist, Al Higginbotham, Sandra Murman, and Mark Sharpe.

The following member was absent: Commissioner Ken Hagan.

Chairman Miller called the meeting to order at 3:02 p.m.

I. <u>LEGAL DEPARTMENT</u> - PUBLIC HEARING ON THE CITY OF TAMPA (TAMPA) REQUEST FOR A VARIANCE FROM THE TAMPA PORT AUTHORITY'S (TPA) MINOR WORKS PERMIT RULES FOR MARINE CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES AT THE TAMPA WATER WORKS PARK PROJECT (APPLICATION 56218).

Tampa, through its Parks and Recreation Department, had filed a request for a variance of the TPA submerged lands management rules over which the EPC had delegated authority to implement. Tampa was seeking a request for a variance to exceed the TPA rule that limited the dock length to no more than 25 percent of the river width. Tampa proposed to construct a dock on the Hillsborough River that exceeded the 25 percent river width for the Tampa Water Works Park. The staff recommended approval of the variance based on Tampa satisfying the requirements in the EPC Administrative Procedures Rule, Section 1-2.50, wherein Tampa had demonstrated a hardship, and the proposed structure would also comply with the underlying purpose of the rule.

EPC General Counsel Richard Tschantz confirmed proper notice and introduced the item. Referring to a map, Attorney Andrew Zodrow, EPC Legal Department, detailed the request. Assistant Tampa Attorney Janice McLean sought approval. Chairman Miller called for public comment; there was no response. Commissioner Murman moved approval, seconded by Commissioner Sharpe. Commissioner Crist made comments. The motion carried six to zero. (Commissioner Hagan was absent.)

administrative matters.

Background: In an effort to provide the Commission with timely information regarding legal challenges, the EPC staff provides this monthly summary. The update serves not only to inform the Commission of current litigation but may also be used as a tool to check for any conflicts they may have in the event a legal matter is discussed by the Commission. The summary provides general details as to the status of the civil and administrative cases. There is also a listing of cases where parties have asked for additional time in order to allow them to decide whether they will file an administrative challenge to an agency action (e.g. – permitting decision or enforcement order), while concurrently attempting to seek resolution of the agency action.

EPC LEGAL DEPARTMENT MONTHLY REPORT March and April2014

I. ADMINISTRATIVE CASES

Suzanne Bellerose [14-EPC-001]: On February 14, 2014 the Appellant, Suzanne Bellerose filed a Notice of Appeal challenging the issuance of the TPA Minor Work Permit #56105 for the removal and replacement of a dock. The Appeal was deemed to be insufficient and an Order Dismissing Appeal with Leave to Amend was issued. The Appellant had until March 17, 2014 to file an amended appeal. On March 10, 2014 the Agency received an amended Notice of Appeal. This second Notice was deemed insufficient. An Order Dismissing Amended Appeal with Leave to Amend was issued. The Appellant had until March 26, 2014 to file a second amended appeal. No second amended appeal was filed and the permit was issued becoming a final order of the Agency. (AZ)

James Baldor [12-EPC-015]: On October 24, 2012, the Appellant, James Baldor, filed a request for an extension of time to file an Appeal challenging the Denial of Application for Minor Work Permit #53790. The extension has been granted and the Appellant filed an appeal in this matter on December 28, 2012. The appeal was transferred to a Hearing Officer on January 15, 2013, EPC filed a Motion for Summary Recommended Order and on February 20, 2013, the Hearing Officer ruled in favor of the EPC. The matter was heard at the August 15 2013 regular EPC meeting for consideration of a Final Order, however, the matter was continued with the intention to enter into settlement negotiations with the parties. The parties reached an agreement and a permit was issued on March 19, 2014. If no administrative challenges are received within the 20 day time allotment, the Appellant will dismiss the appeal and the matter will be closed. (AZ)

J.E. McLean, III and RaceTrac Petroleum, Inc. [12-EPC-014]: On October 24, 2012, the Appellants, RaceTrac Petroleum, Inc. and the property owner, filed a request for an extension of time to file an Appeal challenging the Executive Director's denial for wetland impacts on the corner of Lumsden and Kings Avenue. The extension was granted and the Appellants filed an appeal in this matter on December 7, 2012. A Hearing Officer has been assigned and conducted a case management conference. This matter has been placed in abeyance as the parties are discussing options.(AZ)

Tampa Electric Company, Polk Power Station, Polk 2-5 Combined Cycle Conversion Project: [12-EPC-016]: EPC is a commenting agency and potential administrative party to this DEP power station siting certification permit application and hearing. (RT)

Joseph and Jennifer Ferrante [12-EPC-006]: On May 7, 2012 the EPC received a Request for Variance or Waiver from Joseph and Jennifer Ferrante. The Applicant is requesting a waiver from a provision within the Submerged Lands Management Rules of the Tampa Port Authority regarding setback encroachments. A public hearing is scheduled for September 20, 2012 to consider the variance. The hearing was continued until further notice. (AZ)

II. CIVIL CASES

Gregory S. Hart and Karin Hart [13-EPC-008]: On October 9, 2013, the Plaintiffs filed a Complaint in Civil Court against the EPC alleging defamation. The EPC filed a Motion to Dismiss. Subsequently the Plaintiffs filed a Motion for Default Judgment. A Motion Hearing was held on March 31, 2014 in which the Court heard both the Plaintiffs' Motion for Default and the EPC's Motion to Dismiss. The EPC's Motion to Dismiss was granted with leave to amend and the Plaintiff's Motion for Default was denied. The Plaintiff has until April 21, 2014 to file an amended complaint. (RT).

PATCO Transports, LLC and Chip Investment 2: On July 28, 2011, the EPC staff received authority to take legal action for various solid waste/landfill violations, specifically unauthorized construction on a historic landfill. The parties entered into a Consent Order on August 25, 2011 to address the violations, however, the Respondent has not complied with the terms of the Consent Order. The Respondent has, among other things, failed to perform landfill gas monitoring and submit monitoring reports. The EPC Legal Department is attempting to resolve the matter but the Respondent has failed to respond in any way. A lawsuit is being prepared. (AZ)

Oak Hammock Ranch, LLC, James P. Gill, III, as Custodian [12-EPC-018]: On December 28, 2012 EPC was served a lawsuit regarding the Upper Tampa Bay Trail Wetland Impact Approval. The EPC has filed it Answer and affirmative defenses to the lawsuit. The Plaintiff has filed a voluntary dismissal and the case will be closed. (AZ)

Greg and Karin Hart [LEPC10-004]: On March 18, 2010 the Commission granted authority to take legal action against the Defendants Mr. and Mrs. Greg Hart for various impacts to wetlands that are violations of the EPC Act, Chapter 1-11 (Wetland Rule), and a conservation easement encumbering the Defendants' property. On March 29, 2010, the EPC filed a civil lawsuit in Circuit Court. The case was consolidated with a related Hillsborough County case seeking an injunction to remove fill from a drainage canal. A second mediation on January 21, 2011, resulted in a very limited partial settlement with EPC and full settlement with the County. A jury trial was held the week of September 19, 2011. The jury returned a verdict in favor of the EPC. Defendants filed a motion for new trial and an appeal of the jury verdict. The appeal was dismissed as premature and the request for a new trial was denied. The Defendants then appealed the denial of a new trial, which was dismissed. A hearing was held on February 13 and 23, 2012, to impose corrective actions and penalties. A Final Judgment Against Defendants was entered on March 5, 2012, requiring Defendants to restore the wetland and pay penalties. Defendants filed a Motion for Relief from Judgment dated May 22, 2012 and the court denied the motion on July 30, 2012. On July 31, 2012, the court awarded the EPC reasonable trial costs. The Harts moved for re-consideration of the Motion for Relief from Judgment denial and it was denied. An appeal of the denial was dismissed. The EPC moved for contempt for failure to restore the wetland, but the Court ordered the EPC to conduct the wetland remediation and charge the Harts. (RM)

<u>Dubliner North, Inc.</u> [LEPC09-015]: On September 17, 2009 the Commission granted authority to take legal action against Respondent for violations of the EPC Act and EPC Rules, Chapter 1-10 (Noise). A Citation to Cease and Order to Correct Violation was issued on July 24, 2009, the Respondent failed to appeal the citation and it became a final order of the Agency enforceable in court. On May 5, 2010 the EPC filed a civil lawsuit in Circuit Court. The Defendant did not respond to the complaint, thus a default was issued on September 30, 2010. A trial was set for the week of May 9, 2011. The parties attended court-ordered mediation on April 22, 2011. A Mediation Settlement Agreement was entered on April 22, 2011. On August 8, 2011, the EPC filed a Notice of Voluntary Dismissal. Defendant has not complied with the terms of the settlement, EPC filed a motion to enforce the Settlement and a hearing was held on August 2, 2012 and a Judgment Against Defendant was entered. The Defendant paid the negotiated penalty, but corrective actions are pending. (RM)

U.S. Bankruptcy Court in re Jerry A. Lewis [LEPC09-011]: On May 1, 2009 the U.S. Bankruptcy Court Middle District of Florida filed a Notice of Chapter 13 Bankruptcy Case regarding Jerry A. Lewis. On May 26, 2009, the EPC filed a Proof of Claim with the Court. The EPC's basis for the claim is a recorded judgment lien awarded in Civil Court against Mr. Lewis concerning unauthorized disposal of solid waste. The EPC is preparing to seek relief from the bankruptcy stay to get an award of stipulated penalties from the state court. The site remains out of compliance with applicable EPC solid waste regulations. (AZ)

Grace E. Poole and Michael Rissell [LEPC08-015]: Authority to take appropriate legal action against Grace E. Poole and Michael Rissell for failure to properly assess petroleum contamination in accordance with EPC and State regulations was granted on June 19, 2008. The property owner and/or other responsible party are required to initiate a site assessment and submit a Site Assessment Report. They have failed to do the required work and the EPC is attempting to obtain appropriate corrective actions. (AZ)

Petrol Mart, Inc. [LEPC07-018]: Authority to take appropriate action against Petrol Mart, Inc. to seek corrective action, appropriate penalties and recover administrative costs for improperly abandoned underground storage tanks and failure to address petroleum contamination was granted on June 21, 2007. The owner of the property is insolvent and the corporation inactive; however, the Waste Management Division intends on obtaining a judgment and lien on the property for the appropriate corrective actions. The Legal Department filed a civil lawsuit on September 26, 2007. The defendant was served with the lawsuit on October 12, 2007. The Court entered a default on November 9, 2007 for the Defendant's failure to respond. The EPC Legal Department set this matter for trial on March 26, 2008. The Court ruled in favor of EPC and entered a Default Judgment against the Defendant awarding all corrective actions, penalties of \$116,000 and costs of \$1,780. In the event the corrective actions are not completed the court also authorized the EPC to contract to have the site cleaned and to add those costs to the lien on the property. PRF monies were allocated in November 2008 to assist in remediating the site. (AZ)

Tranzparts, Inc. and Scott Yaslow [LEPC06-012]: Authority was granted on April 20, 2006 to pursue appropriate legal action against Tranzparts, Inc., Scott Yaslow, and Ernesto and Judith Baizan to enforce the agency requirement that various corrective actions and a Preliminary Contamination Assessment Plan be conducted on the property for discharges of oil/transmission fluid to the environment. The EPC entered a judicial settlement (consent final judgment [CFJ]) with Tranzparts and Yaslow only on February 16, 2007 (no suit was filed against the Baizans). The Defendants have only partially complied with the CFJ, thus a hearing was held on April 28, 2008, wherein the judge awarded the EPC additional penalties. A second hearing was held on January 25, 2010, for a second contempt proceeding and additional penalties. The Judge found the Defendants in contempt and levied stipulated penalties/costs, and a contempt order was executed by the judge on March 15, 2010 requiring the facility to temporarily shut down until the facility is remediated. On January 7, 2013 the EPC deemed the facility had met the CFJ-required remediation requirements, but other obligations are still due as are penalties and costs which have become a lien against the Defendants. (RM)

Boyce E. Slusmeyer [LEPC10-019]: On Sept 20, 2001 the EPC staff received authority to take legal action for failure to comply with an Executive Director's Citation and Order to Correct Violation for the failure to initiate a cleanup of a petroleum-contaminated property. The Court entered a Consent Final Judgment on March 13, 2003. The Defendant has failed to perform the appropriate remedial actions for petroleum contamination on the property. The EPC filed a lawsuit on October 7, 2010 seeking injunctive relief and recovery of costs and penalties. The EPC is waiting for the lawsuit to be served. (AZ)

The following is a list of cases assigned to the EPC Legal Department that are not in litigation, but a party has asked for an extension of time to file for administrative litigation in an effort to negotiate a settlement prior to forwarding the case to a Hearing Officer. Recommendation: Hold a public hearing at the Commission meeting on June 19, 2014, at 9 a.m., to consider amendments to the Delegation Rule, Ch. 1-13, Rules of the EPC.

Brief Summary: Pursuant to the EPC Act, the Commission must hold a noticed public hearing to approve or amend a rule. The EPC staff requests that the Commission approve scheduling a public hearing during its regularly scheduled meeting on June 19, 2014, at 9 a.m. to consider amendments to the Ch. 1-13, EPC Delegation Rule. The rule amendment is required by Florida Statutes to implement the existing State of Florida Environmental Resource Permitting (ERP) delegation program under which the EPC is operating. The rules to be amended are those updated Statewide ERP rules recently adopted by the DEP.

Financial Impact: No Financial Impact

Background: On December 13, 2011, the EPC and the Florida Department of Environmental Protection entered into a delegation agreement transferring a portion of the State environmental resource permitting (ERP) program to the EPC for implementation. In accordance with the delegation agreement, the EPC relies on Part III, Section 1-13.20, Rules of the EPC which includes the relevant sections of the state ERP rules. Pursuant to Section 373.4131(b)(2), Florida Statutes, the EPC must amend its local regulations to incorporate by reference the applicable rules adopted in the new Statewide ERP rules within 12 months after the effective date of the rules. The EPC staff is requesting a public hearing to consider adoptions of the new relevant sections of ERP, which include Chapters 62-330, 40D-1, 40D-4, 40D-40 and 40D-400, Florida Administrative Code and the Applicant's Handbook Volume I that is incorporated by reference in those rules.

Pursuant to Section 5.2 of the Hillsborough County Environmental Protection Act (EPC Act), the Commission must hold a noticed public hearing to approve a rule or rule amendment. The EPC staff requests that the Commission approve scheduling a rule amendment public hearing during its regularly scheduled meeting on June 19, 2014, at 9:00 a.m.

PART I (General Provisions)

It is the Commission's intent that the Director make reasonable effort to coordinate EPC's regulatory activities with other appropriate agencies, either through delegation or other written agreement.

- (1) To the extent possible, implementation of activities on behalf of another agency shall be incorporated and combined with activities of the EPC to minimize duplication. Precisely how activities will be combined shall be identified within the delegation, operating agreement, contract or memorandum of understanding between the affected agencies.
- (2) To the extent appropriate, where EPC implements the authority of another agency pursuant to delegation, EPC shall apply the rules, standards, and criteria of the other agency as described in the written agreement.
- (3) To the extent that EPC regulations require or provide more stringent standards for the protection of the public and the environment of Hillsborough County than the standards and criteria of another agency, provision will be made in the written agreement that recognizes this distinction, and as appropriate, sustains the more

stringent standards.

1-13.02 INTERPRETATION.

To the extent practicable and consistent with our enabling legislation, rules and regulations of another agency shall be interpreted and applied pursuant to delegation according to the meaning given by the other agency.

- (1) Where another agency rule implemented by delegation requires submission of an application, notice or other information to the other agency, that rule will be interpreted as requiring submission to the Director.
- (2) Where another agency rule implemented by delegation requires that the other agency receive submissions, make a decision, issue a document or take some action, it shall be interpreted as requiring these actions from the Director as provided in the written agreement.
- (3) Where another agency rule requires submission of an application fee, provision for its allocation should be reflected in the written agreement with the Commission. Obligation to pay fees under EPC's chapter 1-6 shall be modified according to the written agreement. EPC will make every effort to avoid charging a local fee in addition to the other agency fee, insisting otherwise only to the extent that EPC's expenses in providing services are not fully covered.

1-13.03 CONFLICTS.

The provisions of this rule shall not affect the specific provisions contained in any written agreement, contract, delegation or memorandum of understanding, and shall not be used to create ambiguity where none exists in such written agreement.

PART II (Wastewater Facility Program Delegation)

1-13.10 SOA.

(1) When Commission staff exercise authority delegated from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection pursuant to the

Wastewater Facility Program Specific Operating Agreement entered into between the Secretary of the Department and the Commission, in reviewing, issuing or denying a permit or exemption, inspecting for compliance or enforcing standards and conditions within a permit issued by or on behalf of the Department, they shall use the Department rules in force at the time of the application. Said rules, generally referenced in section 1-13.11 below, are hereby adopted for the limited purpose provided by this paragraph.

(2) Notwithstanding EPC's authority to adopt more stringent standards for Hillsborough County, EPC has not elected to do so in this program as of this time. All of the standards applicable to the Wastewater Facility Program in Hillsborough County are equivalent to those of the Department.

1-13.11 APPLICABLE STANDARDS.

Department rules, standards and criteria applicable to the program addressed in this part include those pertaining to water quality; industrial and domestic wastewater facilities; resource recovery and management; damage assessment; underground injection; final agency action procedures; surface waters and water quality standards; ground water classes, standards and exemptions; wellhead protection; ground water permitting and monitoring; drinking water standards, monitoring, and reporting; permitting and construction of public water systems; wastewater treatment plant monitoring: detergents; collection systems and transmission facilities; reuse of reclaimed water and land application; wetlands application; wastewater facility permitting; wastewater residuals; animal feed lots; wastewater general permits; water quality based effluent limitations; treatment plant classification and staffing; and solid waste facilities.

PART III (Environmental Resource

Permitting - delegation)

1-13.20 ERP Delegation Agreement

- (1) The Florida Department of Environmental Protection (Department) intends to delegate its authority under Chapters 373 and 403, Florida Statutes to regulate certain impacts to wetlands and other surface waters in Hillsborough County pursuant to Chapter 62-344, F.A.C., to the Commission, which requested such delegation and demonstrated to the Department that it has sufficient resources and procedures for the adequate administration and enforcement of a delegated environmental resource permitting (ERP) program. This program will be limited to the activities provided in the delegation agreement between the Department and the Commission.
- a) The delegation agreement provides the Executive Director the authority to review specific activities on behalf of the Department and allows the Executive Director to issue one agency action document for a determination under the applicable state ERP program rules and the local Commission rules: Chapter 1-11 and Chapter 1-14. The standards for processing those permit applications shall be those standards approved under this rule chapter, in addition to the standards in Chapter 1-11 and Chapter 1-14. All other Commission rules, however, shall remain in full force and effect as it pertains to the regulated activities.
- b) The administrative rules for processing the consolidated determinations shall be those adopted in the Commission's Administrative Procedures Rule Chapter 1-2, unless otherwise specifically provided for in this rule chapter. In the event the Commission's local administrative rules are in conflict with the procedural rules set forth in Chapters 120 and 373, Florida Statutes, the state statutes shall govern that specific conflict. The Executive Director shall review the activities eligible under the delegation agreement in accordance with the Commission's applicable local rules and with the following provisions:

- (i) For those impacts to wetlands or other surface waters that are reviewed under Chapter 1-11 and qualify for review under the delegation agreement, the Executive Director, when deciding to authorize impacts to wetlands and other surface waters pursuant to the authority under the applicable rules, shall use the criteria in Sections 373.406, and 373.414(1), (5) and (8), Florida Statutes, as follows: (1) Whether the activity will adversely affect the public health, safety, or welfare or the property of others: (2) Whether the activity will adversely affect the conservation of fish and wildlife, including endangered or threatened species, or their habitats; (3) Whether the activity will adversely affect navigation or the flow of water or cause harmful erosion or shoaling; (4) Whether the activity will adversely affect the fishing or recreational values or marine productivity in the vicinity of the activity; (5) Whether the activity will be of a temporary or permanent nature; (6) Whether the activity will adversely affect archaeological resources under the provisions of section 267.061, Florida Statutes; (7) The current condition and relative value of functions being performed by areas affected by the proposed activity; and (8) The cumulative impact of similar activities pursuant to section 373.414(8), Florida Statutes.
- The Commission hereby adopts Chapters 62-330, 40D-1, 40D-4, 40D-40 and 40D-400, Florida Administrative Code and the Applicant's Handbook Volume I that is incorporated by reference in those rules. These rules are hereby incorporated by reference in accordance with Subsection 373.4131(2)(b)1., Florida Statutes for purposes of implementing the delegated state ERP program. Chapter III of the Southwest Florida Water Management District "Basis of Review" for Environmental Resource Permits as adopted by the Department and Southwest Florida Water Management District. Chapter III of the Water Management District "Basis of Review" dated August 2, 2006 is adopted by reference in this rule and shall be utilized by staff in their review under this Rule.

- (iii) The Commission hereby adopts Sections 40D-4.301 and 40D-4.302, Florida Administrative Code for purposes of implementing the delegated state ERP program.
- (2) The Executive Director, when processing applications under this delegation section, shall comply with any applicable noticing or other procedural requirements that apply to activities regulated under Part IV, chapter 373, Florida Statutes that are subject to the delegation agreement.
- (3) The Executive Director, when processing applications under this delegation section, shall comply with the procedural requirements set forth in Section 120.60, Florida Statutes.
- (4) The Executive Director shall maintain a list of final agency orders under this delegation in accordance with Section 120.53 and 120.533, F.S.
- (5) As provided in Section 373.114, Florida Statutes, and if an appeal is sufficient and timely filed, a decision pursuant to delegation may be reviewed by the Florida Land and Water Adjudicatory Commission as appropriate.

Recommendation: Pass a resolution honoring Sydney Kenneth Potter Sr. for a lifelong dedication and committment to civic activism.

Brief Summary: Mr. Sydney Kenneth Potter Sr. Was a lifelong resident of Hillsborough County. Mr. Potter and his Wife, Thalia, spent most of their time the last several decades performing civic duties for this community.

Financial Impact: No Financial Impact

Background: Mr. Sydney Kenneth Potter Sr. and his wife of 69 years, Mrs. Thalia Lunsford Potter, built their home on the Hillsborough River in 1955 and became the voice of the gently flowing river. Mr. Potter worked tirelessly to protect the river and helped form the Friends of the River organization to ensure the long term health of Tampa's main tributary.

Mr. Potter was the driving force behind CRAM, the Citizens for Responsible Application of Malathion, after an outbreak of Mediterranean fruit flies threatened the local citrus crops in the early 1980's. Mr. Potter and CRAM opposed the State's indiscriminate spraying of Malathion and succeeded in convincing the State to use sterilized male Mediterranean flies which successfully solved the problem.

In 2008, Mr. and Mrs. Potter were honored by the League of Women Voters of Hillsborough County, which established the "Sydney and Thalia Potter Civic Leadership Award" to recognize people committed to good government, protection of the environment, and community activism.

Sydney Kenneth Potter Sr. died at his home on Monday, March 24, 2014.

He received an EPC certificate and will receive a one-year membership to the Florida Aquarium for receiving EPC's Environmental Merit Award.

Brief Summary: EPC Staff will be providing an update to the Board on its progress to date on working with the Molten Sulfur Industry to develop Best Management Practices to prevent and minimize sulfur fires and spills, along with the designation of May as Clean Air Month, and the hosting of EPC's 13th annual Clean Air Fair and Photo Contest at Poe Plaza. In addition, EPC Staff will be informing the Board of EPA recent approval of the FDEP/EPC's 2013 Ambient Air Monitoring Network Plan, which was recognized by EPA for having highest population coverage of any state in the Southeast.

Financial Impact: No Financial Impact

Background:

Molten Sulfur Workgroup Update

In response to several August 2013 sulfur fires at Gulf Sulphur Services' Hookers Point site, EPC Staff was directed by the Board during the September 19, 2013 EPC Meeting to work the Molten Sulfur Industry to use the existing EPC rules and State permits to require regular inspection and maintenance programs for sulfur tanks in Hillsborough County to reduce the chance of sulfur fires and spills. This was to include improved emergency notification procedures and better communications with the Port and affected Fire Rescue Departments. EPC staff created a Molten Sulfur Workgroup consisting of industry representatives from the 4 different companies that handle molten sulfur in the County, and has held several meetings with industry representatives to develop Best Management Practices, which can be incorporated into their existing permits to prevent and minimize fires and spills. EPC staff is providing an update to the Board on their progress to date and some of the significant findings of Gulf Sulphur Services' in-house investigation and corrective actions.

Clean Air Month & Fair

Once again this year, EPC is celebrating the month of May as Clean Air Month, and will be hosting on May 1, 2013 the 13th Annual Clean Air Fair at Poe Plaza in downtown Tampa from 11:30am-1:30pm. The Clean Air Fair is the signature public outreach event organized annually by EPC, and is typically attended by over an estimated 1,000 visitors each year and includes over 40 exhibitors. EPC established this year's theme for Clean Air Month as "Environmental Stewardship Begins With...YOU!", which is intended to remind us that environmental protection starts with each individual's awareness, attitude and actions, and by working together, we can protect our natural surroundings for a healthier and more sustainable future. The goal of the fair is to highlight local air quality, to

promote a healthy environment through public education, and to recognize environmentally-conscious organizations and companies that contribute towards making our community a better place to live.

As part of Clean Air Month, EPC is hosting the 13th Annual EPC Clean Air Month Photo Contest in conjunction with the Hillsborough County School System. The contest is eligible to all Hillsborough County high school students, and added this year were select middle schools which focus on an arts or environmental curriculum. The winning photographs will be displayed at the Clean Air Fair, in the County Center lobby, and the EPC lobby. The winning photographs are also scheduled to be recognized in May during the EPC Board meeting.

FDEP/EPC 2013 Ambient Air Monitoring Network Plan

On November 22, 2013, The US-EPA approved the Florida Department of Environmental Protection's 2013 Annual Ambient Air Monitoring Network Plan for 2013 for the State of Florida, which includes 206 air monitors (35 in Hillsborough County) placed strategically throughout the state, covering 91 percent of Floridians. Florida, the fourth-most populous state, has the highest percentage population coverage of any Southeastern state and second-highest among the six most populated states.

The FDEP/EPC network adheres to federal regulations by monitoring for ozone, particulate matter, nitrogen dioxide, sulfur dioxide, carbon monoxide and lead, and uses these monitors to ensure compliance with federal air quality standards and state rules.

Brief Summary: Facilitation efforts as directed by the Board have proved successful. The neighbors have agreed

to a location for the placement of a boat lift.

Background:

On August 15, 2013, the Board of the Environmental Protection Commission directed EPC's Director of the Wetlands Management Division (Dr. Emery) to pursue a settlement to the ongoing dispute between Mr. Javier Baldor and Mr. Paul Byrum over the placement of a boat lift structure. This neighborhood dispute has resulted in an administrative challenge based on the EPC's denial of an application to install a boatlift within the neighbor's setback. After lengthy facilitation efforts on the part of staff and cooperation between the neighbors, we are pleased to report that the two neighbors have reached a settlement which tentatively should result in the administrative action being closed. Mr. Baldor's modified application has been processed by EPC and has become final with respect to the entities who received a copy of the permit. EPC staff believes there is no longer a need to continue with the administrative challenge based on the modified application and the subsequent approval of the structure. EPC has requested of the appellant that his appeal be formally dismissed based on the matter becoming moot. As of the date of this agenda item being processed, EPC is awaiting that dismissal notice. Upon receipt of a voluntary dismissal, the administrative case will be closed.

Subject: Update on Environmental Bills at the 2014 Florida Legislature

Agenda Section: Regular Agenda

Item: Legal and Administrative Services Division

Recommendation: Informational Report Only

Brief Summary: The 2014 Florida Legislative Session began March 4, 2014 and will end Friday May 2, 2014. EPC staff presented an initial summary of relevant environmental bills at the Commission meeting in February.

Staff will provide a brief update regarding those bills.

Financial Impact: No Financial Impact

Background: The 2014 Florida Legislative Session commenced on March 4, 2014. It lasts for 60 days and will end Friday May 2, 2014. The EPC staff tracks dozens of environmental and administrative bills and the State budget. Additionally staff provides comments, analysis, and assistance to the County's Public Affairs Office, the Florida Association of Counties, and the Florida Local Environmental Resource Agencies (FLERA). The Commission approved a basic legislative strategy (EPC Policy No. 2007-02) on March 15, 2007, that gives staff continuing direction to monitor, comment on, and lobby for, among other things, bills that impact the functions of the EPC. EPC staff presented an initial summary of environmental bills at the Commission meeting February 20, 2014.

The following are a few bill of interest:

HB 49 - Springs Revival Act

Sponsors: Senator Soto and Reps. Stewart, Saunders, and Watson

Related Bills: SB 76

Summary: Requires the water management districts to identify first and second (i.e. large) magnitude springs that appear to have lower water levels or poorer water quality, then develop a 5-year plan to restore them, and authorizes the districts to adopt rules and issue orders. Quarterly reports to the Governor and legislative leaders will be required. There are no first magnitude springs in Hillsborough County, but about six second magnitude springs.

UPDATE: These bills have not been to one committee and the focus has been on a different set of springs bills (SB15767/HB1313), thus it appears these will not pass.

SB 1576: Springs

Sponsor: Senator Dean

Committees: Environmental Preservation and Conservation; Agriculture; and Appropriations.

Related Bills: HB1313

List of Attachments: None

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Summary: The bills focus on spring shed protection and funding sources. It assigns flow protection to the Water Management Districts and water quality protection to the Florida DEP. None of the protected springs are in Hillsborough, so this bill would not impact us. It is environmentally protective and expensive legislation. The Senate Bill second Committee Substitute is in its third and last committee. This springs bill has support in the Senate, but not the House mainly due to cost and added regulations. The following are a few concepts being proposed:

- Protections proposed in the bill to Florida's 33 first-magnitude springs (flows greater than 100 cubic feet per second or 64 mgd) and six other identified springs: DeLeon, Peacock, Poe, Rock, Wekiwa and Gemini. None in Hillsborough County.
- Creates a new section (Part VIII) to Chp. 373, F.S. called the Florida Springs and Aquifer Protection Act.
- Recognizes that springsheds must be identified and protected too to help the spring survive.
- Creates a definition for Outstanding Florida Springs (OFS) to include first magnitude springs and other springs.
- Directs state and local governments to work cooperatively to delineate the springsheds and the Water Management Districts (WMDs) must codify the springshed via a rule.
- Requires to WMDs to create minimum flows and levels (MFL) for the OFS.
- WMD must implement a recovery plan for each spring that is not meeting or project not to meet its MFL.
- It requires the Department of Environmental Protection to establish protection/ management zones for the OFS by July 2015.
- Each local government located partially or fully within a spring protection and management zone of an Outstanding Florida Spring impaired by nutrients, must adopt at least the minimum requirements of the DEP's Model Ordinance for Florida Friendly Fertilizer Use on Urban Landscapes. Would not impact Hillsborough, as we do not have any of the listed springs, but we already adopted a version of the rule.
- DEP is required to implement total maximum daily load provisions and develop basin management action plans (BMAP) for those watersheds that are impaired, including allocation of pollutant loads for agricultural fertilizer, wastewater treatment facilities, residential fertilizer, and other typical sources of nutrients (e.g. nitrogen and phosphorus). Agricultural interests will have two years from BMAP adoption to implement appropriate measures.
- By 2021, all wastewater treatment plants must meet 3 mg/L Total Nitrogen.
- By 2016 the DEP must identify all septic tanks in the springsheds. By 2017 all local governments must enact remediation plans to upgrade those septic tanks or connect them, if warranted.

HB 71 - Fracturing Chemical Usage Disclosure Act

Sponsor: Rep. Rodrigues

Related Bills: HB 157 - Public Records/Fracturing Chemical Usage Disclosure Act

Summary: HB 71 directs DEP to designate or establish online hydraulic fracturing chemical registry for all wells that chemical fracturing occurs. It requires service providers, vendors, and owners or operators of wells on which hydraulic fracturing treatments are performed to disclose the chemical ingredients used and the volume of water used. It authorizes DEP to adopt rules to implement the bill. HB 157 would protect chemicals used for fracturing from disclosure as exempt from public records if they were trade secrets. EPC is not aware of efforts to frack in Hillsborough County.

UPDATE: HB 71 and HB 157 do not have Senate companions and both still have two committees to go. They have not even been discussed in a committee during the regular session; the only discussion was in a committee before the session.

SB 312 - Agriculture/Taxes/Water Retention

Sponsor: Sen. Simpson

Summary: The bill states that if agricultural property is used to store waters (flood the land) for a Water Management District project (i.e. – Everglades water storage and treatment areas), it will be deemed non-income producing agricultural land but it will be assess as agricultural land for tax purposes.

UPDATE: Strike all amendment was approved. Lands flooded will still be classified as nonproducing agricultural lands, but they will be assessed under section 193.011, F.S. (which is the main statute for assessing property value), as opposed to just stating it will be assessed as agricultural property. The bill is in its last committee.

HB 703 - Environmental Regulation

Sponsor: Rep. Patronis

Committees: Agriculture & Natural Resources Subcommittee; Agriculture & Natural Resources Appropriations

Subcommittee; Local & Federal Affairs Committee; and State Affairs Committee

Related Bills: SB 1464 (Sen. Simpson)

Summary: HB 703 is the annual omnibus Environmental Regulatory bill sponsored by Rep. Patronis. This year's bill has a variety of changes to environmental regulations, including some local government preemption. Most notable to local governments is the following proposed revision to section 163.3162(3)(i)(1)

(i) This subsection does not limit a county's powers to: 1. Enforce wetlands, springs protection, or stormwater ordinances, regulations, or rules adopted before July 1, 2003, excluding any modification, readoption, or amendment approved on or after July 1, 2003.

This proposal would clarify that any local government wetland regulatory program that was grandfathered under this law, cannot be adopted, modified, or amended after July 1, 2003, as it relates to agricultural activities impacting wetlands. By way of back ground, local governments that had wetland, springs protection, and stormwater regulations prior to July 1, 2003 were grandfathered about 5 years ago and were allowed to continue to regulate agricultural activities, even if arguably duplicative of State or Federal rules. This amendment clarifies that the local rules that existed on July 1, 2003 are the version that must apply to the agricultural community, not amendment after 2003. EPC made amendments favorable to agricultural interests between 2007 - 2008, and we have express concern that those agricultural friendly changes would be undone. The EPC requested the Commission oppose this subsection of the bill. On February 20, 2014, the Commission voted to monitor the legislation.

Other proposed legislation in the bill is as follows:

- Comprehensive Plan and plan amendments shall be adopted by a simple majoring of the local board. Some governments require a super-majority vote, thus it will be easier to amend a comp plan for the better or the worse.
- Prohibits local government from rescinding a comp plan amendment for a non-agricultural land use on land that continues to be used for bona fide agricultural purposes.
- Water Management Districts and DEP may grant 50 year permits for projects that involve surface water storage, release, or recharge.
- Water Management Districts and DEP may grant 30 year permits for development of regional impact in rural areas of critical economic concern.
- State-delegated local governments conducting water well construction regulatory programs for the State must apply State rules and criteria and local rules are preempted.
- Allows submitting proof of insurance to be a method of proving financial responsibility for a mitigation bank.
- Changes to regional water supply planning laws. Exempts agricultural from currently required water supply planning analysis.
- Establishes a solid waste landfill closure account within the Solid Waste Management Trust Fund to assisting in closure and long-term maintenance of landfills.
- Exempts Sector Plans and DRI master plans from Chp. 373 analyses and requires the water needs of those projects to be included in the Regional Water Supply Plans.

The bill was discussed March 4 in its first committee, House Agriculture & Natural Resources Subcommittee, and Rep. Patronis introduce a <u>committee substitute (CS)</u> that is similar to the original Senate companion, SB 1464. The CS was approved and it differs from the original HB 703 as follows:

1) Removes a proposed anti-regulatory greenhouse gas provision.

- 2) Preempts local wetland regulations against a water control district that already have a state or federal wetland/surface water permit (e.g. ERP). Should not impact EPC powers, but does impact Orange County.
- 3) Requires the DEP to adopt rules by January 2015 that detail how an entity can meet the financial responsibility requirements prescribed for mitigation banks.
- 4) Included a section that allows for an easy two-year permit extension to state wetland permits (Part IV Chp. 373) and local government development orders and building permits that expire between Jan. 1, 2012 and Jan. 1, 2015.

UPDATE: The Committee Substitute passed through the Agriculture & Natural Resources Appropriations Subcommittee unchanged on 3/31/14 and now is in the State Affairs Committee with no set meeting date to be discussed. As the Senate version is substantially different, we expect to see changes in this next Committee. Representative Patronis has indicated he may not push this bill, as its companion is struggling in the Senate.

SB 1464 - Environmental Regulation

Sponsor: Sen. Simpson

Committees: Environmental Preservation and Conservation; Community Affairs; Appropriations; and Rules.

Related Bills: HB 703

Summary: This is the companion bill to HB703. The two newer provisions in this bill that the CS HB703 now contains are as follows:

1) There is no anti-regulatory greenhouse gas provision

2) Included a section that allows for an easy extension to state wetland permits (Part IV Chp. 373) and local government development orders and building permits that expire between Jan. 1, 2012 and Jan. 1, 2015. If a person asks for an extension before December 31, 2014, they can get a two-year permit extension from their permit's current date of expiration. This similar extension has been approved the past few sessions. CS HB 703 does not currently include a deadline (12/31/14) to apply for the extension.

UPDATE: On March 26, 2014, the Senate's Environmental Preservation and Conservation Committee heavily amended this bill, taking out two provisions of concern to local governments, but they still are in HB 703. Notably, the Senate Committee removed the wetland local government preemption language regarding the proposed ban on rule amendments after 2003. Additionally, they removed proposed language regarding local preemption of wetland regulation in water control districts (mainly impacting Orange County). The Senate's Community Affairs Committee will discuss this bill on April 8, 2014 and Senator Simpson, the bill sponsor, temporarily postponed the discussion of the bill at the committee. Thus, it is possible that the Senate bill may die if the Committee does not reconvene or a special rule provision is not utilize to remove it directly to the Senate floor.

HB 1077 - Development Exactions

Sponsor: Rep. Perry

Related Bills: SB 1310 - Development Exactions (Sen. Evers)

Summary: The bill states that local governments may not require a permitee to build, maintain, or improve a public, private, or public-private infrastructure or facility that is unrelated to the direct impact of a proposed development, improvement project, or the subject of an application for a development order or administrative approval. It further states that exactions can be no more stringent than those required by the State. It does not prohibit a local government from "imposing a tax, fee, charge, or condition or requiring any other development exaction that serves to mitigate the direct impact of the proposed development and that has an essential nexus to, and is roughly proportionate to, the impacts of the proposed development" upon any public or private land maintained, owned or controlled by the local government. This should not impact the EPC and the bills have not been heard in committee.

SB 830 Carryout Bags (Plastic Grocery Bags)

Sponsor: Sen. Bullard

Committees: Environmental Preservation and Conservation; Community Affairs; and Commerce and Tourism. Related Bills: HB 1257 (Withdrawn from consideration)

Summary: Current law prohibits local governments from regulating plastic bags at stores until a DEP study is formally adopted. The study was completed in 2010, but not adopted. This bill would lift the local preemption and provides that larger grocery stores and pharmacies could not use plastic grocery bags, but must offer re-usable bags for free or sale, or they can sell paper bags of recycle paper. Part of the bag fee would be used for school funding. Local government's regulations must follow those statutory requirements. The bill was to be discussed at the Senate's Environmental Preservation and Conservation Committee on March 26, 2014, but they ran out of time to consider it. Also, the House version (HB 1257) was withdrawn from consideration. On April 10 the Senate's Environmental Preservation and Conservation Committee finally discussed the bill, but realizing it had too many committees to still go to this session and no comparable House version, the sponsor, Senator Bullard, withdrew the bill and it is temporarily postponed. Thus, it is highly unlikely it will pass this year.


