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The Environmental Protection Commission (EPC), Hillsborough County, Florida, met in Regular Meeting, scheduled for Thursday, February 19, 2009, at 9:00 a.m., in the Boardroom, Frederick B. Karl County Center, Tampa, Florida.

The following members were present: Chairman Al Higginbotham and Commissioners Kevin Beckner, Jim Norman (arrived at 9:22 a.m.), Mark Sharpe, and Kevin White.

The following members were absent: Commissioners Rose Ferlita (schedule conflict) and Ken Hagan.

Chairman Higginbotham called the meeting to order at 9:04 a.m., led in the pledge of allegiance to the flag, and gave the invocation.

CHANGES TO THE AGENDA

Dr. Richard Garrity, EPC Executive Director, noted Item III.F., wetlands Internal Performance Auditor (IPA) quarterly report, was withheld for discussion by Commissioner Beckner and would be considered under the Wetlands Management Division section.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Mr. August Muench Jr., 3031 Manatee Avenue, thanked Dr. Garrity for meeting with him to discuss concerns regarding Cockroach Bay, would be meeting with the Planning and Growth Management Department about concerns, had started a preservation committee for Cockroach Bay, commented on tax dollars spent on Cockroach Bay and seagrass being destroyed, noted the need to send data to the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) so State guidelines could be established, questioned destroying something future generations could enjoy, and referenced a booklet sent to EPC Board members.

CITIZENS ENVIRONMENTAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE (CEAC)

Report from the Chairman, David Jellerson - Mr. Jellerson said the February 2, 2009, CEAC meeting included a review of bylaws/regulations and development of the planning calendar for the upcoming year, reviewed the two primary purposes of CEAC, and reported CEAC would be looking at Tampa Port Authority expansion plans, Cockroach Bay protections, water conservation, mangrove trimming, wetlands hybrid rule, and greenways. The 2009 pollution recovery fund (PRF) grant applications were now being accepted and information could be found on the EPC website.

Chairman Higginbotham called for a motion to approve the Consent Agenda. Commissioner Sharpe so moved, seconded by Commissioner White, and carried four to zero. (Commissioner Norman had not arrived; Commissioners Ferlita and Hagan were absent.)

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

New EPC Website - Ms. Elaine Deleeuw, EPC, demonstrated the updated EPC website. Chairman Higginbotham made laudatory remarks.

Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Policy Establishing Numeric Nutrient Standard for Florida - Dr. Garrity commented on previous standards and confusion, said EPA and FDEP had accepted the definition created by the Tampa Bay Estuary Program, noted EPA had determined numeric nutrient quality standards were necessary for the rest of the State/country, stated FDEP aimed to set nutrient standards in the same time frames as EPA and to set standards for different regions, reported EPC rules included FDEP water quality standards, and would continue to monitor the issue.

<u>Processed Yard Waste Workshop</u> - Dr. Garrity reviewed the purpose of the workshop and those involved and announced the workshop was scheduled for March 5, 2009, at 6:00 p.m., at the EPC building in Sabal Park.

FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

<u>EPC Vehicle Fleet Utilization</u> - Ms. Kathy Fitzhugh, EPC, highlighted the report, including efforts/ideas to improve efficiency, Mercury Associates Incorporated fleet utilization study results, meetings to discuss the Fleet

Management Department assuming operational responsibility for the EPC motor pool, formalization of an internal fleet utilization policy, and continuing efforts to improve efficiency.

WETLANDS MANAGEMENT DIVISION

Wetlands IPA Quarterly Report - Chairman Higginbotham suggested the report be a regular discussion item, rather than a Consent Agenda item. Mr. Robert Stetler, EPC, highlighted activities at the time of the audit and reviewed recommendations related to automation/streamlining, performance measures, interagency coordination, quality assurance/program enhancements, and customer service. In response to queries from Commissioner Norman regarding previous discussions about the use of waste from ditches, Mr. Stetler noted advances on that issue, an FDEP consent order, issues related to potential contamination, testing of materials, and a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with the Public Works Department giving discretion to move materials. Commissioner Norman recalled conversations about using materials for roadbeds and commented on canal dredging and the volume of materials hauled.

Mr. Hooshang Boostani, Director, EPC Waste Management Division, reported FDEP and the County had negotiated a consent order where FDEP would perform investigative work to ensure water was not contaminated. Commissioner Norman opined noncontaminated materials could be used. Mr. Boostani said use of the noncontaminated materials was at the discretion of the County. Commissioner Norman had not heard anything about systems in place. Dr. Garrity would meet with the Public Works Department and bring back a report. Chairman Higginbotham recommended discussions with the three municipalities about the MOU and new regulations and to bring back a report.

Joint Presentation with Planning Commission (PC) and Follow-up Discussion on Wetlands Protection and Long-Range Planning - Mr. Stetler highlighted the report, noting meetings held, participants, focus areas, PC contributions, site-specific examples, and EPC findings and commitment to interagency communication. Mr. Shawn College, PC, thanked Commissioner Norman for moving the process forward; commented on the PC perspective and the need for the PC and Metropolitan Planning Organization to inform EPC when plans were adopted and include EPC early in development of higher density transit conflicts; corridors and station locations to avoid connectivity; stressed the need for continued dialogue/coordination; opined staff could meet growth and environmental goals with the application of findings. Commissioner Beckner commended efforts and noted the importance of

coordination. Dr. Garrity offered laudatory remarks regarding staff efforts. Commissioner Norman referenced cooperation among organizations.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 10:06 a.m.

Background: Staff recommends the Environmental Protection Commission accept the purchase order for \$40,000 from the Tampa Bay Estuary Program to collect and analyze benthic samples from Tampa Bay and its tidal rivers.

In Charting The Course, the Comprehensive Conservation and Management Plan for Tampa Bay, several actions items rely on baseline information for sediments constituents, contaminates and fauna. In support of these action items the Tampa Bay Estuary Program, (TBEP) has issued a purchase order to EPC provide the 2008 Bay-wide Benthic Monitoring data. EPC's Benthic Monitoring Program and EPC's Chemistry Laboratory have demonstrated expertise in this type of work. The Environmental Protection Commission of Hillsborough County (EPC) continues to support our commitment to the Comprehensive Conservation and Management Plan for Tampa Bay as developed and administered by the Tampa Bay Estuary Program (TBEP) and its partners.

The Tampa Bay Sediment Quality Assessment Group (SQAG), organized through the TBEP, has identified 9 priority areas within Tampa Bay for development of sediment quality action plans. At the October 2007 SQAG meeting, McKay Bay was ranked as the highest priority area for additional research and development of a sediment quality action plan. The intent of this SCOPE OF WORK is to support the next steps in achieving the recommendations adopted by the SQAG for McKay Bay.

Objective: EPC will collect sediment samples from a total of 120 locations in MacKay Bay. Sample collection will occur as two discrete sampling events. EPC will analyze sediment samples from each of the 120 locations for silt-clay proportionality. EPC will analyze eighty (80) sediment samples, a subset of the 120 locations, for chemical contaminants, i.e. organic compounds and metals. All collection and analyses will utilize established methods, consistent

with other benthic sediment work conducted by EPC for the TBEP. All work will be conducted with strict adherence to all applicable quality assurance and quality control protocols.

Methods and Timelines: The first sampling event will take place in the Spring of 2009. Eighty (80) sampling locations, selected through a random selection process, will be provided to EPC. EPC will collect and preserve sufficient quantities and replicates of sediment samples to accommodate all analyses. Field methods, including applicable quality assurance and quality control, will be consistent with those adopted for the Tampa Bay Benthic Monitoring Program as described in Courtney et al. (1995). Silt-clay proportionality analysis will be performed on sediment samples from all eighty (80) sampling locations using the method described in the EPA guidance document, Environmental Monitoring And Assessment Program (EMAP), Laboratory Methods, C.J. Strobel3, et.al (1995). Sediment samples from forty (40) of the eighty (80) sediment quality sites will be randomly selected by TBEP to be analyzed by EPC for chemical contaminants. Chemical contaminants include selected EPA priority pollutant metals and selected EPA priority pollutant organic compounds. Standard analytical methods, including EPA Method 8080 for organics and poly-chlorinated biphenyls (PCBs), EPA Method 8270 for polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons (PAHs), and EPA Method 200.7 for metals will be used to determine chemical contaminants. Additional compounds that have been identified as 'contaminants of concern' (COC) by the TBEP may be included in the analyses at the discretion of the EPC's laboratory based on time constraints, availability of funds and analytical capability.

The second sampling event will take place in the Fall of 2009 and will be comprised of 40 sampling locations. Sample locations will be provided to EPC, based on the results of the first sampling event. EPC will collect and preserve sufficient quantities and replicates of sediment samples to accommodate all described analyses. All 40 sediment samples will be analyzed for silt-clay proportionality and chemical contaminants using the methods and protocols as described above for the first sampling event.

<u>Deliverables</u>: Collection will begin within 3 weeks of a Purchase Order being accepted by EPC. EPC will provide the results of the all analyses, as described above, for each sampling event within three (3) months of collection. The Purchase Order will be deemed complete when EPCHC has provided to the TBEP a complete dataset of all analytical results for the sediment sampling activities described above and TBEP has accepted the results as complete and derived in accordance with the methods described in this SCOPE OF WORK.

A. ADMINISTRATIVE CASES

NEW ADMINISTRATIVE CASES [0]

EXISTING ADMINISTRATIVE CASES [4]

Florida Gas Transmission Co., LLC [LEPC08-029]: On October 31, 2008 Florida Gas Transmission Company, LLC filed an application for an order granting a certificate of public convenience and necessity authorizing the construction and operation of natural gas pipeline and compression facilities and to acquire pipeline facilities. On November 13, 2008 the EPC Board granted the Legal Dept. authority to intervene in the FERC certification process to protect the interests of Hillsborough County's environment. The EPC filed its motion to intervene on November 26, 2008. In the next few months a draft Environmental Impact Statement will be issued by FERC that all interested parties should review and comment on (RT/RM).

Martini Island Land Co. [LEPC07-023]: On August 29, 2007, the Appellant filed a request for an extension of time to file an appeal to challenge a Citation to Cease and Order to Correct that was issued by the Water Mgmt Division. The request was granted and the Appellant had until September 21, 2007 to file an appeal. On Sept. 21, 2007 the Appellant did file an Appeal challenging the Citation to Cease and Order to Correct. The parties are negotiating. (RM)

Conrad Yelvington Distributors, Inc. v. EPC [LEPC08-004]: On February 7, 2008, Conrad Yelvington Distributors, Inc. filed a formal petition challenging a draft Air Operating Permit Renewal (No. 7770473-008-AO). The parties have met to discuss the matter and the case was put in an informal abeyance in an effort to resolve matters. A draft permit has been negotiated and the EPC awaits the permittee's withdrawal of its petition before the permit will issue. On February 11, 2009 the Petitioner filed a Withdrawal of Petition and the case has been closed. (RM)

Michael and Jemimah Ruhala v. DEP and EPC [LEPC08-012]: On May 16, 2008, the Ruhalas filed Chp. 120 petitions against two wastewater treatment permits the DEP Parks Department requested and received modifications on for an expanded effluent sprayfield system at the Hillsborough River State Park. The parties conducted settlement negotiations twice in June and the DEP is investigating reasonable modifications. The parties placed the case in a brief abeyance in an effort to seek settlement. (RM)

Phillips Munzel Oil Co., Inc. Robert G. Phillips, Individually, and Clyde W. Munzel Individually [LEPC09-003]: On February 19, 2009 the EPC Board granted authority to take legal action against the Respondents for violations of the EPC Act, Chapter 1-7, EPC Rules and Chapter 62-770, FAC. Citations of Violation were issued on June 25, 2008, the Respondents failed to appeal the citations and they became final orders of the Agency enforceable in Court. The violations have not been corrected. (AZ)

EXISTING CIVIL CASES [15]

Michael Robilotta [LEPC08-032]: On December 18, 2008 the EPC Board granted authority to take legal action against Respondent Michael Robilotta, owner and operator of the Old Estates Mobile Home Park, for violations of the EPC Act and EPC Rules Chapter 1-1, General Rules and Chapter 1-5, Water Pollution. Respondent failed to respond to the Citation issued on September 15, 2008 and also failed to respond to the Consent Order offered on November 3, 2008. The Citation became final and is enforceable in Circuit Court. One February 18, 2009 the EPC filed a Complaint in Circuit Court for civil penalties and injunctive relief. (RM)

Fuego Churrascaria Steakhouse Corp. [LEPC08-027]: On November 13, 2008, the EPC Board granted authority to take legal action against Respondent Fuego Churrascaria Steakhouse Corp. for violations of the Noise Rule, Chapter 1-10. On March 18, 2008 staff hand delivered a Citation to Cease and Order to Correct Violation. Respondent failed to respond and

the Citation became final and is enforceable in Circuit Court. On February 18, 2009 the EPC filed a Complaint in Circuit Court for civil penalties and injunctive relief. (RM)

Realty Group, LLC., SRJ Enterprises, LLC and Surinder Joshi [LEPC08-028]: On November 13, 2008, the EPC Board granted authority to take legal action against the Defendants for unresolved violations of several EPC Rules including the Waste Management Rule, Chapter 1-7, the Storage Tank Rule, Chapter 1-12, and the Water Quality Rule, Chapter 1-5 at the 301 Truck Stop. The EPC is preparing to file a lawsuit in this matter. (AZ)

Grace E. Poole and Michael Rissell [LEPC08-015]: Authority to take appropriate legal action against Grace E. Poole and Michael Rissell for failure to properly assess petroleum contamination in accordance with EPC and State regulations was granted on June 19, 2008. The property owner and/or other responsible party are required to initiate a site assessment and submit a Site Assessment Report. They have failed to do the required work and the EPC is attempting to obtain appropriate corrective actions. (AZ)

Letty Cueva and Patricia Vaca (Causeway Station) [LEPC08-005]: Authority to take appropriate legal action against Letty Cueva and Patricia Vaca for failure to comply with the terms of the Consent Order entered on December 21, 2004 was granted on March 20, 2008. The Consent Order required the Defendants to submit and complete a Post Active Remediation Monitoring Plan (PARMP) or to submit and complete a Remedial Action Plan (RAP) and submit a \$500.00 penalty to the EPC. The EPC is attempting to re-negotiate a settlement to resolve the matter. (AZ)

Ecoventure New Port I, LLC [LEPC08-006]: Authority to take appropriate legal action against Ecoventure New Port I, LLC for failure to assess petroleum contamination in accordance with EPC and State regulations was granted on March 20, 2008. The property owner is required to initiate a site assessment and submit a Site Assessment Report. They have failed to do the required work and the EPC is attempting to obtain appropriate corrective actions. (AZ)

<u>U-Haul Company of Florida</u> [LEPC04-016]: Authority to take appropriate action against U-Haul Company of Florida for failure to conduct a landfill gas investigation and remediation plan was granted September 18, 2003. The EPC Legal Department filed a lawsuit on September 3, 2004 and the case is progressing through discovery. The parties attended a court ordered mediation on May 15, 2007. The parties are in settlement discussions concerning the preparation and implementation of a Remedial Action Plan to address the landfill gas danger at the facility. (AZ)

Miley's Radiator Shop [LEPC06-011]: Authority was granted on April 20, 2006 to pursue appropriate legal action against Miley's Radiator Shop, Calvin Miley, Jr., Calvin Miley, Sr., and Brenda Joyce Miley Tyner for waste management violations for improper storage and handling of car repair related wastes on the subject property. In addition, a citation was entered against the respondents on October 28, 2005 requiring specific corrective actions. The Respondents have not complied with the citation. The EPC is preparing to file a lawsuit for the referenced violations. (AZ)

Kenneth Fisher v. EPC and Ahmed Lakhani [LEPC07-014]: Kenneth Fisher filed a civil lawsuit seeking to foreclose on a property that the EPC has a judgment lien. The Legal Department filed its answer on June 8, 2007 responding to the lawsuit by stating its lien is superior to the Plaintiffs. (AZ)

Petrol Mart, Inc. [LEPC07-018]: Authority to take appropriate action against Petrol Mart, Inc. to seek corrective action, appropriate penalties and recover administrative costs for improperly abandoned underground storage tanks and failure to address petroleum contamination was granted on June 21, 2007. The owner of the property is insolvent and the corporation inactive; however, the Waste Management Division intends on obtaining a judgment and lien on the property for the appropriate corrective actions. The Legal Department filed a civil lawsuit on September 26, 2007. The defendant was served with the lawsuit on October 12, 2007. The Court entered a default on November 9, 2007 for the Defendant's failure to respond. The EPC Legal Department set this matter for trial on March 26, 2008. The Court ruled in favor of EPC and entered a Default Judgment against the Defendant awarding all corrective actions, penalties of \$116,000 and costs of \$1,780. In the event the corrective actions are not completed the court also authorized the EPC to contract to have the site cleaned and to add those costs to the lien on the property. (AZ)

Medallion Convenience Stores, Inc. and MDC6, LLC [LEPC07-034]: The Commission granted authority to take appropriate action against Medallion Convenience Stores, Inc. and MDC6, LLC on December 13, 2007 for failure to comply with a consent order. The consent order required the facility to submit a Discharge Report Form for petroleum discharge and submit proof of an N.P.D.E.S. permit for de-watering activities at the site. The EPC is attempting to

negotiate a settlement in this matter. (AZ)

Chase Home Finance, LLC [LEPC08-001]: Chase Home Finance LLC filed a civil lawsuit seeking to foreclose on a property that the EPC has a judgment lien. The Legal Department filed its answer on January 24, 2008 responding to the lawsuit. (AZ)

Tranzparts, Inc. and Scott Yaslow [LEPC06-012]: Authority was granted on April 20, 2006 to pursue appropriate legal action against Tranzparts, Inc., Scott Yaslow, and Ernesto and Judith Baizan to enforce the agency requirement that various corrective actions and a Preliminary Contamination Assessment Plan be conducted on the property for discharges of oil/transmission fluid to the environment. The EPC entered a judicial settlement (consent final judgment [CFJ]) with Tranzparts and Yaslow only on February 16, 2007. The Defendants have only partially complied with the CFJ, thus the case has been re-opened in the Circuit Court in order to enforce the CFJ and hold the Defendants in contempt. A hearing was held on April 28, 2008, wherein the judge awarded the EPC additional penalties. The Legal Dept. filed a proposed Supplemental Judgment with the Court. The Court entered the Order on May 15, 2008, and the Defendants have yet to pay any supplemental costs or penalties. (RM)

<u>D.J.P. Investments, Inc.</u> [LEPC08-011]: On May 15, 2008 the EPC Board granted authority to take appropriate legal action against Defendant D.J.P. Investments, Inc. for failure to initiate and complete site rehabilitation activities in accordance with EPC and State regulations for petroleum contamination at the facility owned and operated by the Defendant. The EPC is attempting to obtain appropriate corrective actions. (AZ)

Pedro Olivera [LEPC08-021]: Authority to take appropriate legal action against Pedro Olivera for unauthorized wetland and mangrove impacts was granted on July 17, 2008 at the EPC Board meeting. Subsequently, the parties entered into a consent order which provided for corrective actions as well as payment of appropriate penalties and recovery of staff costs. The Defendant failed to comply with several of the provisions outlined in the Order and on January 16, 2009 the EPC Legal Dept. filed a Complaint against the Defendant in Circuit Court. The parties are in negotiations to settle the case. (AZ)

RECENTLY RESOLVED CIVIL CASES [2]

Bayside Home Builders, Inc [LEPC07-008]: Authority to take appropriate action against the parties was granted by the Commission on February 15, 2007, for failure to comply with a Consent Order payment schedule for asbestos violations. The EPC filed a lawsuit to compel compliance on October 9th and subsequently filed an amended complaint on February 12, 2008. The Defendant has not timely responded to the amended complaint, thus the Legal Dept. filed a Motion for Default which was entered by the Court on March 17, 2008. The Defendant entered into a Consent Final Judgment with the EPC on February 23, 2009 to pay cost and penalties and the case has been closed. (RM)

<u>Julsar, Inc.</u> [LEPC04-014]: Authority to take appropriate action against Julsar, Inc. for illegally removing over 11,400 square feet of regulated asbestos-containing ceiling material was granted on May 20, 2004. A Notice of Violation has issued and was received in early 2007. A Final Order was issued on June 1, 2007, and it was not appealed. The EPC filed a lawsuit to compel compliance on October 9th and subsequently filed an amended complaint on February 12, 2008. The Defendant did not timely respond to the amended complaint and the Legal Dept, filed a Motion for Default which was entered by the Court on March 17, 2008. The Defendant resolved all outstanding issues and on February 11, 2009 the EPC filed a Notice of Voluntary Dismissal without Prejudice. The case is closed. (RM)

C. OTHER OPEN CASES [13]

The following is a list of cases assigned to EPC Legal that are not in litigation, but the party or parties have asked for an extension of time to file for administrative litigation in the hope of negotiating a settlement or the parties have requested a waiver or variance.

Notice of Intent to Initiate Litigation Against EPC, Billy Williams, Claimant [LEPC05-013]: On April 29, 2005 McCurdy and McCurdy, LLP submitted to EPC a Notice of Intent to Initiate Litigation Against Governmental Entity Re: Hillsborough County Environmental Protection Commission on behalf of Mr. Billy Williams, Claimant, for damages sustained on or about December 15-18, 2003. The Notice alleges that Mr. Williams sustained serious bodily injuries and property damage as the result of EPC's actions and inactions with regard to alleged fugitive emissions released into the air by Coronet Industries. The suit could have been filed October 2005 but has not yet been filed. (RT)

Anthony Barretto and Mini Barreto [LEPC08-009]: On March 13, 2008 the Appellants filed a request for an extension of time to file a Notice of Appeal to challenge a Citation of Violation and Order to Correct issued on March 5, 2008 regarding a petroleum cleanup matter. The Legal Dept. granted the request and the Appellants have until July 25, 2008 to file a Notice of Appeal in this matter. (AZ)

Melnico Corporation [LEPC08-010]: On March 13, 2008 the Appellant filed a request for an extension of time to file a Notice of Appeal to challenge a Citation of Violation and Order to Correct issued on March 5, 2008 regarding a petroleum cleanup matter. The Legal Dept. granted the request and the Appellants have until July 25, 2008 to file a Notice of Appeal in this matter. (AZ)

Kelly L. Wishau [LEPC08-013]: On May 22, 2008 the Appellant filed a request for an extension of time to file a Notice of Appeal to challenge a Citation to Cease and Order to Correct Violation issued on April 25, 2008 regarding unauthorized wetland impacts. The extension was granted and the Appellant had until July 3, 2008 to file an Appeal. A second request for extension of time was filed and granted. The Appellant had until August 4, 2008 to file an appeal in this matter. On August 2, 2008, the Appellant filed a third request for extension of time which was granted. The Appellant has until November 3, 2008 to file a petition in this matter. On November 3, 2008 the Appellant submitted a fourth request for extension of time. The extension request was granted and the Appellant has until December 22, 2008 to file an Appeal. The Defendant failed to challenge the Citation and it became a Final Order on December 22, 2008. (AZ)

Tandum Holdings Corp. [LEPC08-020]: On July 29, 2008 the Petitioner filed a request for an extension of time to file a Petition for Administrative Hearing to challenge a Notice of Violation (NOV) issued on July 3, 2008 for unauthorized discharge of domestic and industrial wastewater to the ground and failure to comply with monitoring requirements. The Legal Dept. granted the request and the Petitioner has until September 29, 2008 to file a petition in this matter. The Petitioner failed to file a timely petition to challenge the NOV, thus the EPC issued a Final Order on December 5, 2008. The parties are still seeking settlement options. (RM)

Cory Packaging, Inc d/b/a Master Packaging [LEPC08-024]: On October 15, 2008 the Petitioner filed a request for an extension of time to file a Petition for Administrative Hearing to challenge a draft Air Operation Permit issued to them by the EPC on October 6, 2008. The Legal Department granted the request for extension of time and the Petitioner has until December 22, 2008, to file a petition in this matter. On October 29, 2008, the Petition asked that the extension be extended until February 28, 2009, due to the need for testing of the facility. The Legal Department determined that good cause was demonstrated and granted the extension until February 28, 2008, but no timely challenge was filed. (RM)

Lazzara Yachts of North America, Inc. [LEPC08-025]: On November 3, 2008 the Petitioner filed a request for an extension of time to file a Petition for Administrative Hearing to challenge a draft Air Construction Permit issued to them on October 22, 2008. The Legal Department granted the request for extension of time and the Petitioner was granted until December 22, 2008 to file a petition in this matter. This deadline was extended until January 30, 2009. The Petitioner requested a third extension of time which was granted and the deadline extended to March 16, 2009. (RM)

Lazzara Yachts of North America, Inc. [LEPC08-026]: On November 3, 2008 the Petitioner filed a request for an extension of time to file a Petition for Administrative Hearing to challenge a draft Air Operating Permit issued to them on October 22, 2008. The Legal Department granted the request for extension of time and the Petitioner was granted until December 22, 2008 to file a petition in this matter. This deadline was extended until January 30, 2009. The Petitioner requested a third extension of time which was granted and the deadline extended to March 16, 2009. (RM)

General Chemical LLC [LEPC08-030]: On December 4, 2008 the Petitioner filed a request for an extension of time to file a Petition for Administrative Hearing to challenge a draft Air Operating Permit renewal issued on December 1, 2008. The Legal Department granted the request and the Petitioner has until February 11, 2009 to file a petition in this matter. (RM)

Building Materials Corporation of America [LEPC08-031]: On December 12, 2008 the Petitioner (d/b/a GAF Materials) filed a request for an extension of time to file a Petition for Administrative Hearing to challenge a draft Air Operating Permit. The Legal Department granted the request and the Petitioner had until February 17, 2009 to file a petition in this matter. The outstanding issues have been resolved, a final permit will be issued and the case will closed. (RM)

<u>CSX Transportation, Inc.</u> [LEPC08-033]: On December 23, 2008 the Petitioner filed a request for an extension of time to file a Petition for Administrative Hearing to challenge a Notice of Permit Issuance for a renewed Federally Enforceable State Operating Permit. The Legal Department granted the request and the Petitioner had until March 6, 2009 to file a

petition in this matter. The Petitioner filed a second request for extension of time which was granted and the deadline for filing was extended until April 6, 2009. (RM)

TRANSFLO Terminal Services, Inc. [LEPC09-001]: On January 22, 2009 the Petitioner filed a request for an extension of time to file a Petition for Administrative Hearing to challenge a draft Air Operating Permit. The Legal Department granted the request and the Petitioner has until March 30, 2009 to file a petition in this matter. (RM)

GI Entertainment & Restaurant Group LLC [LEPC09-002]: On February 13, 2009 the Appellant filed a request for an extension of time to file a Notice of Appeal to challenge a Citation to Cease and Order to Correct Violation issued on February 9, 2009. The request was denied and the party has until March 26, 2009, to file an appeal. (RM)

Brief Summary: Spencer Farms, Inc. owns real property located at 6198 Edina Street, Wimauma, Florida. Two Aboveground Storage Tank Systems were located on separate areas of the property. The closure assessment indicated petroleum contaminant concentrations exceeding soil and groundwater cleanup target levels at both locations. Cleanup of the discharge has not been completed and the property is not in compliance with the EPC Act and Rules of the EPC, Chapter 1-7 and Chapter 62-770, Florida Administrative Code.

Financial Impact: There is no immediate financial impact anticipated for this item. Funding is budgeted

within the general fund monies. EPC will seek to recover the costs of any litigation.

Background: On October 5, 2005, Spencer Farms, Inc. (SFI) closed two Aboveground Storage Tank Systems on the property. Tank #1 was a 10,000 gallon tank installed in 1983 and was located on the east part of the property. Tank #2 was a 3,000 gallon tank installed in 1990 and was located on the west part of the property. On November 8, 2005 a Discharge Report Form was submitted for soil and groundwater target level exceedences at both locations on the property. The Closure Report for the tank removals was received on December 15, 2005. The discovery of soil and groundwater concentration above cleanup target levels requires a Site Assessment (SA) be initiated within 30 days and a Site Assessment Report (SAR) be submitted within 270 days. A SAR was not timely submitted and on June 27, 2006, a Citation of Violation and Order to Correct (Citation) was issued to SFI. The Citation directed SFI to initiate a SA within 20 days and submit a SAR within 180 days of receipt of the Citation. On January 5, 2007, EPC staff received the SAR. The SAR was incomplete and on January 24, 2007, EPC staff sent a letter to the Vice President of SFI directing that a SAR Addendum be completed and submitted to EPC within 60 days. Subsequent conversations and letters were sent on February 6, 2008, June 17, 2008 and August 7, 2008 directing that a SAR Addendum be submitted to EPC. The Citation has not been appealed and is now a final order by operation of law. The violations have not been corrected.

Brief Summary: EPC is seeking to enforce the terms of a Final Order dated January 30, 2009, issued to 2601 Hillsborough, LLC as the property owner and Charlie Mavros as the owner and operator of the Sparkling Waters Car Wash located at 8611 N. Dale Mabry Highway, Tampa, for an unpermitted and unauthorized discharge of car wash wastewater to the ground and for converting one of the six wand car wash bays into a rollover car wash bay without the appropriate permit from the EPC.

Financial Impact: There is no immediate financial impact anticipated for this item. Funding is budgeted within the general fund monies. EPC will seek to recover the costs of any litigation.

Background: Through a State delegation of wastewater regulation from the DEP to the EPC, the EPC issued Notice of Violation, Orders for Corrective Action, and Administrative Penalty Assessment (NOV) #07-0030IW to 2601 Hillsborough, LLC as the property owner and Charlie Mavros as the owner and operator of Sparkling Waters Car Wash, a car wash business located at 8611 N. Dale Mabry Highway, Tampa, folio number 024157-0000, in Hillsborough County, on November 25, 2008.

The NOV alleged 2601 Hillsborough, LLC and Charlie Mavros violated Rules 62-620.300(1), (2), and (3) and 62-660.803(5)(a) and (d), and (6), Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.), by discharging car wash wastewater to the ground via the facility's irrigation system without a permit from EPC and Rules 62-4.030, 62-4.540(2), 62-620.300(5), and 62-660.803(2)(b), F.A.C., by deviating from the permitted activity, as evidenced by one of six wand car wash bays being converted into a rollover car wash bay without the appropriate permit from the EPC. On February 4, 2009, EPC staff observed the rollover car wash bay had subsequently been taken out of service.

The NOV included Orders for Corrective Action requiring: the immediate compliance with all Department rules regarding industrial wastewater treatment systems and to not return the rollover car wash bay into service without an appropriate permit from the EPC; the immediate cessation of the discharge of car wash water from the on-site irrigation system and severance of the connection between the car wash and irrigation system; to ensure all wastewater is properly managed and disposed; the payment of \$3,000 for administrative penalties for the violations above; and, the payment of \$630 for reimbursement of EPC staff costs and expenses. 2601 Hillsborough, LLC and Charlie Mavros did not file a responsive pleading to request a hearing therefore the NOV was adopted into a Final Order on January 30, 2009, which was not appealed.

Therefore, EPC staff recommends that you grant authority to pursue appropriate legal action and grant Executive Director settlement authority.

Recommendation: Grant EPC staff authority to take appropriate legal action, including but not limited to a civil law suit, and authorization to settle a civil suit, against A-Team Demo and any corporate officers.

Brief Summary: A-Team Demo, Inc is the owner and operator of a demolition company in the state of Florida. A-Team Demo has a history of asbestos violations for which the Air Management staff took enforcement and on September 16, 2009, EPC and A-Team Demo entered into a Consent Order (settlement). Among other requirements in the Consent Order, A-Team Demo must make monthly payments to the EPC to satisfy agreed upon penalties and costs. A-Team Demo has only made a few payments and now is delinquent. Air Management staff was subsequently informed by letter that A-Team Demo has ceased all operations.

Background: Pursuant to a delegation agreement with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, all demolition projects and all projects involving the removal or disturbance of regulated asbestos-containing material conducted in Hillsborough County are subject to the prohibitions and conditions of the EPC Act and rules promulgated thereunder, the Florida Administrative Code, and the National Emission Standard for the Hazardous Air Pollutant Asbestos, 40 CFR 61, Subpart M. (Asbestos NESHAP). On April 4, 2007, EPC staff inspected and found a demolition project in progress at the corner of Faulkenberg Road and Leroy Ave. The trailer homes being demolished belonged to Hillsborough Community College who contracted with A-Team Demo to take care of all aspects of the demolition project. Laboratory analysis of samples from the site and an after-the-fact survey revealed the roof coating and linoleum contained 5% - 15% chrysotile asbestos. EPC staff did not receive a notification and fee for the project, and a thorough inspection was not performed prior to beginning the project as required by rule. It was also determined that A-Team Demo was not licensed to remove, handle, or dispose of asbestos and failed to take the required actions, resulting in violations of the Asbestos NESHAP, adopted by reference in Rule 62-204.800, F.A.C., and Section 1-3.26, Rules of the EPC.

An agreement (aka Consent Order) was subsequently reached with A-Team Demo on September 16, 2009, for the violations and as such, the A-Team Demo was to make monthly installment payments of \$376.47 for penalties and staff costs. The payments were not completed and EPC staff was informed on February 25, 2009 that the A-Team Demo has ceased all operations. EPC staff is seeking authority to sue the company and potentially its corporate officers in the event the company defaults on the agreement as detailed in the Consent Order or if it has any new environmental violations.

Brief Summary:

Staff are providing a brief informational update with regard to the County's management of storm water system sediments.

Background:

Beginning in April 2001, the Hillsborough County Public Works Department's Transportation Maintenance Division (TMD) suspended the regular maintenance of storm water systems (roadway ditches, swales, and catch basins) while resolving issues with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) regarding the management of the storm water sediment street sweepings stockpiles at the four Road Maintenance Units. In order to address alleged violations of State solid waste regulations created by the unpermitted and long term stockpiling of the materials, the County entered into a Consent Order (OGC Case No. 01-1651) with the FDEP on December 2, 2005.

Staff are providing a brief informational update with regard to the status of the FDEP's Consent Order and the County's storm water system maintenance program.

Background: Since receiving direction from the Board in January 2009 to work closely with Hillsborough County staff and the community on managing fertilizer use in residential settings, EPC staff is leading a Technical Staff Coordination (TSC) Group on the issue. The TSC Group has held two "fact-finding" meetings (on February 24th and March 3rd) thus far, and the Group will meet for a third time in mid-April. The TSC Group includes representation from several county departments, along with a representative from the University of Florida/IFAS extension service to Hillsborough County.

To date, the TSC Group has focused on developing consensus for key issues such as public education and outreach programs on fertilizer use, and possible training/certification programs for companies that apply fertilizer in residential settings. The TSC Group will soon begin reaching out to neighboring communities around Tampa Bay to achieve a consistent approach for managing residential fertilizer use in the Tampa Bay area. Most recently, representatives from the TSC Group participated in a meeting of the county's Agricultural Economic Development Council held in Valrico, where residential fertilizer use was a topic for discussion.

Background: The 2009 Florida Legislative Session began on Tuesday March 3, 2009, and will end on May 1, 2009. The Environmental Protection Commission (EPC) staff is tracking numerous environmental and administrative bills and various committee deliberations during the Legislative Session. Additionally, EPC staff is providing analysis and comments to the County's Public Affairs Office and the Florida Association of Counties staff. The EPC General Counsel will provide a briefing on some of the environmental and administrative bills that could potentially impact the EPC.
