After speaking on the fertilizer ban and keeping the bay clean and seagrass healthy, Commissioner Cohen talked about water quality and the need for canal dredging. Commissioner Owen asked how the short-term seagrass gains happened. Following discussion, Commissioner Kemp opined on opening areas under the bridges to allow flushing of the bay. Commissioner Cohen spoke to the septic-to-sewer conversion. Mr. Sherwood responded to inquiries about temperature impacts on seagrass.

Brief Summary: This notification is to assist Commissioners in identifying potential conflicts of interest that may exist and that may require disclosure prior to taking action in a quasi-judicial administrative matter. It is also intended to assist Commissioners in avoiding discussing matters with parties during administrative or civil litigation.

Financial Impact: Standard litigation costs are included in the Legal Department's operating budget, but any individual case may require a future budget amendment.

List of Attachments: None

Background: The EPC Legal Department primarily handles litigation in administrative and civil forums. A list of <u>new</u> cases the EPC opened since the previous Commission meeting is provided below. Occasionally, a new case or cases, may be disposed of in between the prior and current EPC meetings, yet this list will still be provided for continuity and consistency.

Administrative appeals (a/k/a administrative hearings, petitions, challenges, or Section 9 Appeals) involve challenges to agency actions such as permit application decisions or administrative enforcement actions (e.g. – citation or consent order). These proceedings are conducted before an appointed hearing officer who enters a recommended order after an evidentiary hearing. After the hearing officer issues the recommendation, the administrative appeal is transferred back to the Commission to render a final order. Acting in this quasi-judicial capacity, the Commission and all parties are subject to ex-parte communication restrictions. After receipt of an appeal or a request for an extension of time to file an appeal, the Commission should avoid discussing those cases. The chart below generically refers to these cases as "Administrative Appeal," but it could also be an extension of time to file an appeal.

The purpose of providing notice of new cases is to assist Commissioners in identifying persons or entities that may present a conflict of interest. Certain conflicts may require the Commission to recuse themselves from voting on a final order. Please note, the Legal Department provides notice of sufficient

appeals to the Commission via e-mail to assist in the conflict check process and as a reminder to limit communications; therefore, the Commission may have already received prior notification of the administrative case(s) listed below.

If the EPC becomes a party in civil litigation either through an approved Request for Authority to Initiate Litigation or by receipt of a lawsuit, the case will also be listed below. Any attorneys representing opposing party(ies) must communicate through the EPC counsel and should not contact the Commission directly. It also recommended that the Commissioners avoid discussing litigation prior to consulting with EPC counsel.

Background: Pursuant to Rule 14 of the Rules of Order of the Environmental Protection Commission (EPC), the Commission is to meet on the third Thursday of each month at 9 a.m.

At the EPC Commission meeting held on January 18, 2024, the Commission voted to amend the Rules of Order, Rule 14, changing the frequency of EPC meetings from monthly to four times per year with a 2024 meeting schedule of January, April, August, and October based on historical and contractual agency needs. Further, the Commission voted to change the start time of EPC meetings from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m.

The EPC Rules of Order must be amended by vote at two separate meetings pursuant to Rule 29. A vote to amend the rules during this meeting would be considered the second and final vote making the amendment to Rule 14 effective. See proposed amendment to Rule 14 below:

Brief Summary: Currently, the Executive Director has authorization to initiate and enter into contracts for goods and services not to exceed \$100,000, subject to budgetary constraints without Commission action. Approval of this request would increase the Executive Director's procurement limit to \$250,000, which would align with the County Administrator's current procurement limit.

Background: In 2006, the Commission voted to authorize the Executive Director to enter into contracts for goods and services not to exceed \$100,000, subject to budgetary constraints. The BOCC had granted similar authority to the County Administrator. The BOCC has since raised the County Administrator's procurement limit to \$250,000. This request would align the Executive Director's procurement limit with the County Administrator, including execution of contracts/agreements.

Staff is also requesting that the Executive Director's procurement limit be updated automatically in accordance with any future increases to the County Administrator's procurement limit.

Brief Summary: Jose Luis Ramos, Trustee, owns property located at 6925 East Broadway Avenue, Tampa. A retail fuel station operated as Broadway Quick Mart Inc. (Operator), exists on the property. The facility includes four underground storage tanks (UST). The facility has several violations of applicable State of Florida rules regarding USTs under which the EPC has contracted authority. The required work to correct the violations has not been completed and the property owner and Operator remain responsible for corrective actions and to comply with Citations of Violation and Orders to Correct issued in February 2024. The Operator and property owner are currently not in compliance with the applicable UST rules and staff requests authority to take legal action.

Financial Impact: Funding for litigation can vary. The EPC may utilize general fund and Waste Division contract funds to support the litigation. The EPC will seek to recover the costs of any litigation.

Background: The EPC, through a contracted program with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP), conducts compliance and enforcement actions in Hillsborough County concerning Underground Storage Tanks (UST). The EPC also has authority for this action under its Enabling Act, Chapter 84-446, Laws of Florida, as amended and the EPC has adopted in EPC Rule Chapter 1-12, Storage Tank Rule, the standards and criteria from FDEP Rule Chapter 62-761, F.A.C. to address this type of UST violation.

The Respondent Jose Luis Ramos, Trustee of the Ramos Separate Property Trust Dated December 30, 2002, owns property located at 6925 East Broadway Avenue, Tampa, Florida, folio # 159720-0500. A retail gasoline station operated by Broadway Quick Mart Inc. (Operator), is located on the Property. On August 3, 2023, an anonymous complaint was received by EPC regarding the facility. The EPC Storage Tank Compliance staff conducted a complaint inspection at the facility the same day and observed free product (gasoline) bubbling up from under the concrete in the tank pad area. It was determined that the facility had a large discharge of an unknown quantity of petroleum product due to a failure of the underground storage tank system. The facility estimated that the discharge was at least 700 gallons. Subsequently, a Discharge

Report Form was filed on August 4, 2023, which required the initiation of a Site Assessment and subsequent submittal of a Site Assessment Report. EPC staff have requested product inventory documentation to have a more accurate account of the discharge. The facility also was required to perform integrity testing of each component of the storage tank system within three days of a discharge. Inventory records and complete integrity test results have not been provided to date.

Inspections of the property conducted on November 1, 2022 and August 3, 2023, revealed several violations of applicable UST rules under which the EPC has contracted authority. Specifically, the Operator and property owner have failed to comply with the following rules:

- a. Section 62-761.420(2), F.A.C. Failure to maintain current financial responsibility for the storage tank systems. Pursuant to section 62-761.801,F.A.C., storage tank systems with a lapse in financial responsibility for a period of 90 days or more are required to be properly closed.
- b. Section 62-761.600(4), F.A.C. Failure to meet release detection standards.
- c. Section 62-761.700(1), F.A.C. Failure to repair or isolate a component or piping that has caused a discharge or release.
- d. Section 62-761.500(7), F.A.C. Failure to submit required annual operability testing of the overfill protection devices for 2023.
- e. Section 62-761.500(4)(b), F.A.C. Failure to maintain fill box covers according to requirements.
- f. Section 62-761.600(1)(f), F.A.C. Failure to maintain release detection per manufacturer's instructions or standards.
- g. Section 62-761.430, F.A.C. Failure to perform investigation into the presence of fuel in the diesel tank interstice within 14 days.
- h. Section 62-761.700(3), F.A.C. Failure to perform periodic integrity testing of the secondary containment within required timeframes.
- i. Section 62-761.600(1)f, F.A.C. Failure to install, maintain and operate the release detection device per manufacturer's standards.
- j. Section 62-761.440(6)(b), F.A.C. Failure to immediately take action to contain, remove and abate the discharge.
- k. Section 62-761.440(6)(c), F.A.C. Failure to perform integrity testing of each component of the storage tank system within three days of a discharge unless the storage tank system has been properly placed out of service.

The required work to correct the violations has not been completed and the Operator and property owner remain responsible for corrective actions. A Citation of Violation and Order to Correct was issued to the Operator on February 6, 2024 and to the property owner on February 7, 2024, for the failure to address the UST rule violations. The Operator and property owner remain out of compliance with the applicable laws and rules concerning underground storage tanks in Hillsborough County.

The EPC staff request the Commission grant staff authority to take appropriate legal action, including but not limited to filing a civil lawsuit, and to authorize the Executive Director to enter into any potential settlement.

Brief Summary: Hillrise Enterprises, LLC owns real property located at 1102 East Laura Street, Plant City, Florida, folio #206699-0000. On August 1, 2020, three (3) 2,500-gallon leaded gasoline underground storage tanks (USTs) and one (1) 1,500-gallon kerosene UST were closed in place at the property. On April 21, 2021, the EPC received a Tank Closure Assessment Report that revealed petroleum-contaminated soil at the property. On May 18, 2021, the EPC received a Discharge Report Form (DRF) from the property owner for the contaminated soil. Pursuant to Chapter 62-780, Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.), a site assessment must be performed and a Site Assessment Report (SAR) must be timely submitted for the discharge. No SAR was submitted and on November 7, 2023, a Citation of Violation and Order to Correct was issued against the property owner for the failure to submit the SAR. The EPC has made several attempts to negotiate a settlement with the property owner, however, there has been no adequate response.

Financial Impact: Funding for litigation can vary. EPC may utilize general fund and Waste Division contract funds to support the litigation. EPC will seek to recover the costs of any litigation.

Background: The Environmental Protection Act of Hillsborough County, Chapter 84-446, Laws of Florida, as amended (EPC Act), Chapters 376, and 403, Florida Statutes, authorize and empower the Environmental Protection Commission of Hillsborough County (EPC) to enforce rules and regulations to protect, control, abate, and prohibit pollution in Hillsborough County. The EPC is also contracted to conduct petroleum cleanup regulatory authority on behalf of the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP).

Hillrise Enterprises, LLC, owns real property located at 1102 East Laura Street, Plant City, Florida, folio #206699-0000. On August 1, 2020, three (3) 2,500-gallon leaded gasoline underground storage tanks (USTs) and one (1) 1,500-gallon kerosene UST were closed in place. On April 21, 2021, the EPC received a Tank Closure Assessment Report that revealed petroleum-contaminated soil in the UST area located west of the building. On May 18, 2021, the EPC received a Discharge Report Form (DRF) from the property owner for the contaminated soil. On May 19, 2021, the EPC issued a letter to the property owner requesting that a site assessment be performed, and a Site Assessment Report (SAR) be submitted in accordance with

the requirements of Chapter 62-780, F.A.C.. As the above-referenced property remains out of compliance pertaining to the State and EPC's petroleum contamination regulations, the EPC is pursuing enforcement. On November 7, 2023, a Citation of Violation and Order to Correct was issued against the Respondent for the failure to submit a SAR. On June 21, 2021, the EPC sent a follow up letter to the property owner requesting the SAR be submitted no later than February 14, 2022. The EPC notes the following violation of EPC adopted rules.

• Section 62-780.600(7), F.A.C. – Failure to provide the professionally certified Site Assessment Report (SAR) within 270 days of the petroleum discharge discovery date.

The required work to correct the violation has not been completed and the property owner remains responsible for corrective action. The property owner remains out of compliance with the Citation and the applicable laws and rules governing or pertaining to petroleum contamination in Hillsborough County.

The EPC staff request the Commission grant staff authority to take appropriate legal action, including but not limited to filing a civil lawsuit, and to authorize the Executive Director to enter into any potential settlement.

Brief Summary: In 2021, the EPC Commission approved an additional round of monitoring to be conducted to further assess the potential impact of radon and dust in the community surrounding the phosphogypsum stack at the Mosaic Riverview site in Riverview, FL. This study, which serves as a follow up to the original studies completed in 2010 and 2013, was contracted with the Florida Department of Health Bureau of Radiation Control to conduct ambient air radon monitoring from July 2022 to June 2023. As a part of the completed contract, FDOH has provided a final report which summarizes the findings of the study.

Financial Impact: No additional funds required.

Background: The original studies that were conducted in 2010 and 2013 were a part of a Condition of Development of Regional Impact (DRI) # 242 that required Mosaic to conduct dust and radon monitoring at previously identified locations surrounding their phosphogypsum stack (including expansion area) near Riverview, FL. The original studies did not identify a significant impact from the stack to the neighboring communities. With the changes and increased size of the phosphogypsum stack at the Mosaic Riverview site, the EPC Commission requested an additional round of radon and dust monitoring to assess potential impacts to the surrounding community. EPC coordinated with Mosaic to be granted site access to the Mosaic Riverview site and with the School District of Hillsborough County to be granted access to three schools located nearest to the phosphogypsum stack. EPC contracted with FDOH to have the Bureau of Radiation Control perform four 90 day monitoring periods at the selected sites to assess ambient radon and gamma radiation levels. EPC also established a collocated dust monitor at a selected school site to provide ambient dust comparison data for the area surrounding the phosphogypsum stack. This third phase of the study was funded through the EPC Pollution Recovery Fund as approved by the EPC Commission in 2021.

The results of the study indicated that generally low radon levels exist around the area, and the schools again had readings lower than the control site over 4 miles away. The FDOH report concluded that: "[n]one of the measurements taken in this project would suggest remedial actions...." The additional monitoring confirmed the original studies findings that indicated the stack operations were not significantly impacting the local area in regards to dust or radon.
